College Applications: 3 main parts



Application Form:

- Most schools offer application options:
 - Institutional App
 - Common App
 - Coalition App
- Completed online

Official High School Transcript:

- Some colleges allow grades & GPA to be self reported
- If official transcript is required, must request through <u>Parchment</u>
- Cost per transcript (F/R waivers)
- You set up an account last spring
- You will need to work with Parchment if you forgot your username and password.





ACT/SAT Test Scores:

MWHS does not send test scores to colleges

- 1. Select up to 4 colleges free of charge through registration process
- 2. Request any additional scores through testing agency cost per score.

Some College Applications may have additional components/requirements

Counselor Forms:

- \rightarrow Not required by all colleges.
- → Might also be called a Secondary School Report
- → Is a mandatory part of the Common App
- → Notify counselor and submit a <u>Senior Information Sheet</u>
- → Expect a 2 week turnaround time

Recommendations:

- → Not required by all colleges
- → Understand the process and notify the teacher/advisor
- → Submit a <u>Senior Information</u> <u>Sheet</u>
- → Allow enough time (at least 2 weeks)
- → Write a THANK YOU note

ACT/SAT

Taking/Re-taking

- ACT: <u>www.act.org</u>
 - October 26th (deadline 9/20)
 - December 14th (deadline 11/8)
- SAT: <u>www.collegeboard.com</u>
 - November 2nd (deadline 10/2)
 - December 7th (deadline 11/7)
- SAT also has subject tests that may be required or recommended
- Take advantage of sending scores to colleges at no charge while registering

Sending Scores

- Refer to ACT account to see which colleges already have access to your scores.
- If needed, you can request additional score reports online - \$13 per score report.
- Since most colleges require scores directly from ACT/SAT, MWHS does not send scores.

College Costs

Tuition and Fees - amount varies depending on the school, number of credit hours, whether or not you are a resident, etc.

Room and Board - cost of campus housing and meal plan

Books and Supplies - materials that you will need for classes. Average annual cost for materials at a 4-year public university is \$1,168

Personal Expenses - things you would normally spend money on (cell phone, gas, laundry, entertainment, etc.)

FAFSA

Free Application for Federal Student Aid



- Complete the FAFSA each year as soon after October 1st as possible.
- You will use your 2018 tax information (prior, prior year).
- This form is used to determine what amount of money a family is expected to contribute to the cost of attending a postsecondary institution = Expected Family Contribution (EFC)
- The EFC is used by colleges/universities to determine student grants, loans and work study amounts.
- <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> make sure that you use the .gov not .com. You do not need to pay anything to complete the FAFSA.



Sources of Financial Aid

- More than 60% of MN State University and College students receive financial aid of some sort.
- At the U of M TC more than 70% of enrolled students receive financial aid of some sort.

- Federal/State Aid
 - Complete the FAFSA
 - Need-based
- Institutional Aid
 - Varies from school to school
 - Some need-based and some meritbased
 - Might need to complete an additional form (i.e. CSS Profile)
- Private Aid
 - Scholarships and grants
 - Mostly merit-based
 - Individual applications

- Local Scholarship Program more information to come in February
- Financial Aid Office of the college/university that you plan to attend
- Employers or service organizations that your parents or other family members belong to

Net Price Calculator

- There is a financial aid estimation tool/calculator on every college website (required by law)
- Tool is meant to give families/students an estimation of need-based financial aid that they might qualify for if they were a student during the indicated academic year.
- Helpful to have past tax forms and/or pay stubs because the estimation will only be as accurate as the information that is submitted.
- Official financial aid award packages are only determined after a student applies, is accepted and completes a FAFSA. The Net Price Calculator is just a tool to be used to get an estimation of out of pocket cost.

What to do/When to do it

What to do right now:

- Complete applications for admission to college of your choice
- Attend Financial Aid Information Night: September 30th 7PM Theater
- Complete and submit the FAFSA official form available on October 1st.

What to do between MEA and spring break:

- Search for national scholarships
- Research institutional scholarship availability complete necessary forms
- Submit the local scholarship application (through Naviance)

What to do between spring break and end of the year:

- Review financial aid packages
- Confirm enrollment at college of your choice and adhere to deposit deadlines
- Request a final transcript to be sent to the college that you plan to attend
