Future ACT National Test

- Students register online at <u>www.act.org</u>
- Test dates this year:
 - June 10 (at MWHS) paper/pencil
 - July 15
- Registration is typically due one month prior

ACT & College Admissions

- ACT was NOT required for most schools for the class of 2023
- Most colleges will remain some version of test optional for class of 2024
- University of MInnesota has already decided NOT to require it through 2025
- You should check admissions pages of colleges that you are interested in applying to

ACT & College Admissions

- If students do not submit an ACT, they should assume that other parts will weigh more heavily in the admission decision.
 - This includes: course rigor, gpa, part time employment, variety of activities with leadership, etc.
- Students should consider "traditional ACT requirements" when deciding if they should include their ACT score. If it will help their application, they should include it.
- Most schools will post the middle 50% of submitted ACT scores on their website

Checking your transcript....

Reviewing your transcript will give you a better idea of how you are represented when it is shared with others (employers, scholarships, colleges) Reviewing your transcript allows you to make sure you are **on track for graduation** at MWHS and meeting any admission requirements colleges might have

Graduation Requirements

- 4.0 credits: English
- .25 credit: Speech (exempt if you did not attend MWHS in 9th grade)
- 3.5 credits: Social Studies
- 3.0 credits: Science
- 3.0 credits: Math (including statistics)
- .25 credit: Health
- .5 credit: Phy Ed
- 1.0 credit: Performing or visual art
- 8 credits: additional classes of your choice

TOTAL: 23.5 (each semester is ½ credit)

Checking Your Credits

- Each semester class you pass gets "a check"
- .25 credit is awarded for Health and Speech
- Work through the years on your transcript
- Math will be different for everyone (must include stats):
 - Geometry with Stats
 - FST
 - Online Statistics
 - AP Stats
 - Applied Math

What's Next?

- Contact your counselor with questions
- If you do not have enough credits for next year (can earn a max of 7), make arrangements to get those credits done via summer school or night school.
- Make sure your schedule next year reflects what you need to graduate

Next 9 months

- Now: continue to complete college visits, look at alternative options, refine list of post secondary options
- **End of Junior year:** Check transcript. Make sure all high school graduation requirements are accounted for.
- **Summer:** Prepare for applications. Consider recommenders if required, brainstorm essay topics if needed. Prep essays: some schools could require multiple essays.
- Late August/Early September: Applications open-review requirements and begin the process. Note deadlines.

Fall semester senior year

- September-October: complete and submit applications (early deadlines)
- November: Research national scholarship opportunities through places of employment, scholarship search sites, etc.
- **December:** Attend a Financial Aid Information Night in early December.
- January: Complete FAFSA (this is a change from last year)
- November-January: Await admissions decisions and confirm enrollment

Consider looking into the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum

- Designed to provide a seamless transition to a Minnesota four year college or university after completing designated classes
- You can start at a variety of colleges including, Normandale,
 Minneapolis College, or Hennepin Technical College

What makes an application complete

- Application submitted
- Application fee paid
- Transcript sent through Common App or Parchment
- Standardized test scores sent when applicable

Be aware of different deadlines:

Rolling Decision: Applications will be reviewed as they are accepted

Regular Decision: Applications are due on a certain date and reviewed in no particular order

Early Action: Students apply by certain date and are guaranteed a decision by a certain date

Early Decision: Students apply by a certain date and get a decision by a certain date. THIS IS BINDING: upon acceptance, student must withdraw all other application at other institutions.

Different types of applications

- Institutional Application: published by the college or university only for that particular college or college system (e.g. Wisconsin or Minnesota university system).
- **Common Application:** a general application that many colleges use for admission. General information is shareable but colleges might have supplemental requirements.
- Coalition Application: general application that is used by other institutions. The Coalition App is meant to be more of a portfolio tool aimed at equal access for high school seniors.

Essays

- An opportunity bring the applicant to life and share what NOT in other areas of the application
- Recommended to stay away from talking about an sport/activity unless you are going to talk about a specific personal characteristic or skill that was developed
- Students should be comfortable with doing multiple drafts and digging into the "micro" aspects of things
- How does this narrative make you standout against other applicants and contribute to their campus

 Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story. 	
The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?	
Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?	
Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?	
 Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others. 	
Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?	
Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.	

It is important to St. Thomas that everyone understands the role they play in creating an inclusive environment on campus and in the broader community. Please share your thoughts and personal experience with diversity, equity and inclusion. Address topics like socioeconomic status, race, ability, sexual orientation or other examples. Most importantly, speak from the heart.

Tell us why you decided to apply to the University of Wisconsin-Madison. In addition, please include why you are interested in studying the major(s) you have selected. If you selected undecided please describe your areas of possible academic interest. (you may enter up to 650 words). *

Letters of Recommendation

- Not all colleges require a letter: check before asking
- Recommendation form: might be required INSTEAD of a letter
- Give recommender at least two weeks to write a letter or complete form
- Request in person with a "senior information sheet" available for reference (should be done before assigned in Common App)
- Thank the recommender via a thank you note
