

Fast Facts:

- Westonka Public Schools is ranked seventh out of 446 Minnesota districts by SchoolDigger
- Westonka students scored #5 in the state in reading and #10 in the state in math on the 2022 Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs)
- Grandview is the #5 "Best Middle School" in Minnesota, according to U.S. News & World Report
- Both Hilltop and Shirley Hills are National Blue Ribbon primary schools
- Even with a voter-approved operating levy increase that will go into effect in 2024, Westonka will still have the lowest school taxes in the county.

Following over a year of research, a demographic study of the school district, a community survey and staff focus groups, the Westonka School Board Facilities Committee has identified three priorities with regard to facilities improvements:

- 1. districtwide **security enhancements** to incorporate best practice safety standards;
- 2. districtwide **deferred maintenance** improvements;
- 3. and a redesign of Mound Westonka High School to enhance the learning environment and improve functionality, safety and pride.

The committee would now like to provide an opportunity for everyone to share their input on the scope of these priorities. Our goal is to ensure the district's direction with regard to future facility improvements aligns with that of Westonka parents, staff and community members.

1. Districtwide Security Enhancements

The following prioritized security enhancements incorporate best practice safety standards:

All School Buildings

- Security zone separation •
- Perimeter door monitoring (propped door alarms) •
- Hardening of glass at entrances and select areas .
- Visual alerts (strobes) .

Mound Westonka High School

creation of a Student Services Center on the north end of the building

2. Districtwide Deferred Maintenance Improvements

The Westonka School Board Facilities Committee has identified the top maintenance priorities at each building not addressed in the 2011 bond. Significant maintenance items by building include the following:

Hilltop Primary School vear built: 1964 grades K-4 enrollment: 466

- Piping replacement
- Interior door/hardware replacement
- Boiler replacement
- Multiple air handling unit replacement
- Gym dehumidification
- Electrical upgrades (panels, feeders, fans, etc.)
- Locker replacement

Shirley Hills Primary School year built: 1951 grades K-4 enrollment 439

- Piping replacement
- Interior door/hardware replacement
- Exterior facade repairs
- Makeup Air Unit (MAU) replacement
- Computer Room Air Conditioner (CRAC) replacement

District Transportation Building year built: 1970

- Misc. tuckpointing
- Site lighting
- Electrical panel replacement

Grandview Middle School vear built: 1958 grades 5-7 enrollment: 527

- Piping replacement
- Interior door/hardware replacement
- Locker replacement
- Small gym flooring replacement
- Kitchen air handling unit addition

Mound Westonka High School vear built: 1971 grades 8-12 enrollment: 947

MWHS building and campus maintenance would be addressed comprehensively as part of the redesign.

- Aging air handling unit replacement
- Piping (water/sewer) replacement
- Electrical upgrades (panels, feeders, fans, etc.)
- Gym bleachers, curtains and sound • system replacement

- Tennis court reconstruction
- Field #10 (JV baseball) maintenance

3. High School Redesign

The last time the educational spaces at Mound Westonka High School were comprehensively addressed was 30 years ago, following a 1993 bond. The high school redesign would involve a complete renovation of the building and an approximately 32,000 square foot addition.
